Disclaimer: This trip report has been prepared based on notes and recollections made during the course of the 2005 briefing meetings and conversations. Opinions expressed are solely those of the author and do not constitute those of the programs' participants or of the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program or the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program.

Synopsis and Purpose: From March 9th through March 15th, representatives of the non-federal participants in the Upper Colorado Endangered Fish Recovery Program and the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Programs¹ met with staff of the Congressional delegations for the States of Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming, and with Congressional committee staff for the authorizing and appropriations committees having jurisdiction over the Bureau of Reclamation and Fish and Wildlife Service to brief them on the status of the two endangered fish recovery programs and to seek their support for Program funding included in the President's proposed fiscal year 2006 budget and, in the case of FWS "Recovery" funding, to seek the appropriation of funds for fiscal year 2006 at the level provided by the Congress in the FY 2005 Interior and Related Agencies Act for the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program and funding for the San Juan Program Coordinator and his staff. In addition, briefing meetings were held with select Administration officials and several nongovernmental entities. During each of the meetings those representing the two recovery programs addressed four matters:

1. Status of the Upper Colorado Endangered Fish Recovery Program and the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program, the programs' accomplishments with special emphasis on accomplishments during the year that has passed since last year's visits in March 2004,
2. Fiscal Year 2006 funding needs of the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program and San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program.
3. Our efforts to get U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service funding into the FWS portion of the President's budget for Fiscal Year 2007 – and our request that our Congressional delegations sign onto a letter addressed to Secretary of the Interior Norton asking that FWS funding for the FWS annual contributions for the two recovery programs be included in the Department's request and be identified as a high priority.
4. Follow-on discussion from the February 2005 briefings and requests for Congressional assistance to accomplish amendment of the provisions of Public Law 106-392, as amended by P.L. 107-375, to extend the appropriations authorization by \$15 million and period of time to complete the capital construction projects by two years for the two recovery programs.

At each meeting with Congressional Delegation staff members, our group representing the two recovery programs made an identical request – we asked the staff member to request that his or her boss affirm their support by signing onto joint-delegation letters addressed to the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Energy and Water Development and the Subcommittee on Interior and Related Agencies (expressing support and urging the appropriation of specific Bureau of Reclamation and USFWS funding amounts for these two recovery programs).

Our group acknowledged the great importance of past funding support from the Congress as being a key element of the progress that these two programs are making and explained the continuing need for funding and the uses and

benefits being obtained with Program funding. We requested the six individual letters be circulated among the four States' Congressional and Senate delegation members. A key tool in making that request was our presentation to the staff member of copies of funding support letters submitted to each of the appropriations subcommittees by Governors Owens, Huntsman, and Freudenthal. In the case of New Mexico, we had funding support letters signed by State Engineer D'Antonio as Governor Richardson was not available within the time frame required to obtain the letters for use during these briefing meetings (representative copies of those letters are attached). It is particularly important asking Members of Congress to sign on to the joint delegation letters that we have letters from each of the Governors. In addition, a listing of the letters of support that have submitted by municipalities and water user organizations was distributed at each of the meetings to demonstrate the grass roots support that these recovery programs continue to enjoy.

Support of 13 of 14 of the U.S. Representatives from Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming (Rep. Hefley again declined) has again been obtained as evidenced by their signatures on the joint House delegation letters. On the Senate side, we anticipate that four of the eight Senators (Bennett, Hatch, Bingaman and Salazar) will sign the two funding support letters. Senator Domenici and Senator Allard will, we think, abide by the standing policy of not signing appropriation support letters as they are on the Appropriations Committee but we were assured of their assistance and support. Unfortunately, Senators Thomas and Enzi have again taken the position that they do not wish to sign onto these funding support letters.

We received a number of compliments during the meetings for our efforts – including the Program's successes, the quality of the briefing materials and the presentations made, the approaches we are using and our visits to these offices each year. In particular, we noted that none of the Congressional Delegation offices "blinked" when we asked them to sign onto the letters addressed to the Senate and House Interior Appropriations Subcommittee even though the letters request \$691,000 of USFWS "recovery" funding for USFWS employee salaries and office and activities expenses for the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program and \$211,000 for the San Juan Recovery Implementation Program's program management that is not in the President's FY2006 budget.

We are most appreciative of the efforts of those staff members who take on the task of circulating our joint delegation letters for us each year. The letter circulation process, being accomplished by Mac Zimmerman of Congress Tom Tancredo's staff and Mike Connor of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee staff (with Senator Bingaman) was accomplished on the House side before the Easter recess and will be occurring right after the recess on the Senate side. Thanks to both of these people for their assistance.

The Congressional Staff Appreciation Luncheon, our third annual, was held at Tortilla Coast Restaurant on Friday, March 11th. This event was hosted by the Upper Colorado and San Juan water users and we greatly appreciate their generous financial contribution. The event was quite successful. A thank you is extended to Upper Colorado Recovery Program Director Bob Muth for doing a super job with both the PowerPoint presentation and his spoken remarks concerning the capital construction programs being implemented by both programs. Thanks also to Brent Uilenberg for providing photographs and materials used by Bob Muth in his presentation. This event gives us the opportunity to "give back" something when we are making our annual request to our Congressional delegations; provides additional good will, and facilitates the development of relationships with those with whom we meet.

Copies of the briefing booklet and its enclosures have been widely distributed among Program participants – and is available for downloading from the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program's Web page (<http://www.r6.fws.gov/crrip/doc/dc/Highlights04-05.pdf>). The draft joint delegation funding support letters which we asked be signed by the members of the Congressional delegations of the States of Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming, along with the letters of support submitted by Governors Owen, Leavitt, Richardson and Freudenthal are attached to this report.

In summary, our objectives for the trip were accomplished. A list of those who participated in the meetings/briefings is provided below. Not all participants were in Washington, D.C. during the entire period of the trip nor did all participate in each meeting, nonetheless the roster provides a listing of all who participated in one or more meetings.

Synopsis of Meetings and Contacts:

Attached to this report is a table providing a chronological listing of each meeting held. The comments reference specific requests, points of discussion or other information worthy of note, including necessary follow-up that should and will occur.

In addition to the information contained in the table, the meeting with Deputy Secretary of the Interior Lynn Scarlett and FWS Deputy Director Marshall Jones on Friday, March 11th was important in resolving the FWS no-funding problem. The following Monday, March 14th, our group held a follow-up meeting with Marshall Jones, Beth Stevens and Ben Tuggle concerning our need to get the USFWS funding for the recovery programs in the USFWS budget and also included a discussion of the indirect cost recovery rate on funds transferred from the USBR to the USFWS Region 2. Stevens indicated that the USFWS has been directed by the Appropriations Committees to accomplish cost recovery. The Washington Office and Region 2 have the matter under discussion. Stevens indicated that she will follow up with Region 2 to see what the status is. The final approval for overhead waivers is with the USFWS Director.

Relative to the meeting on the preceding Friday with Lynn Scarlett, Jones indicated that the request for inclusion of USFWS funding for the USFWS participation in the two recovery programs will certainly be considered and that the USFWS continues to be operating in a very challenging atmosphere. He confirmed that the deletion of the DOI request for recovery program funding by OMB had been appealed this year after OMB had shaved it on account of it being a Congressional line/earmark, and that it had been appealed last year as well. In response to our question about what else we can do to get this funding back into the FWS “recovery” “base” for FY 2007, Jones responded that we are hitting all of the right bases. The schedule for development, approval and release of the President’s FY 2007 budget was discussed and laid out to be the following:

Jones concluded the meeting by noting that the non-federal participants have been very fair and the USFWS and Department of the Interior also want to be fair.

Follow-up Conducted:

On April 28th, a “cross links” document was submitted to FWS Budget Analyst Mike Hickey at the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). The document was requested by Hickey during our meeting with him. It provides an overview of cross-links among management actions to minimize or remove threats to the listed species identified in the 2002 recovery goals documents and current principal recovery actions of the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program (UCRRP) and the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program (SJRRIP). The purpose of the document is to address the question of how well are your programs accomplishing what the recovery plans establish should be accomplished.

A thank-you letter was sent by the Chairman of the Management Committee to USFWS Deputy Director Marshall Jones for our meeting with him. The letter reiterated the requests that we made relative to inclusion of USFWS recovery funding for the recovery programs in the President’s budget for fiscal year 2007. Additional thank-you notes and e-mail messages were transmitted to the Congressional offices who circulated the joint delegation letters on our behalf.

Conclusions and Recommendations:

Our group representing the two recovery programs again confirmed the vital importance of annually visiting Congressional Committee and Congressional delegation members and/or their staffs to keep the Programs’ needs and ongoing progress in mind. Staff turnover occurs from year to year. Face-to-face meetings continue to have no substitute. The participation of each of the non-federal participants in these briefings is quite important (we really need to have CREDA participate next year).

Meeting with Policy, Management and Budget Division and Budget Office personnel is very important. Ensuring funding in future fiscal years will require meeting with PMB folks each year to ensure that we remain “in sight and in mind.” We submitted questions for appropriations subcommittee hearings where Administration officials responsible for requesting appropriations for our Program will be testifying this year and should continue to be mindful of these opportunities in the future.

We asked – and got - the great majority of our Congressional delegation members to sign onto joint delegation letters addressed to the Secretary of the Interior reminding the Secretary of her funding commitments to the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program and San Juan Recovery Program. Having this third letter circulated at the same time as the appropriation support letters were being circulated made logistical and timing sense – it is little additional work and this is the right time of the year to bring political pressure to bear as the fiscal year 2007 budget formulation process proceeds within the Department of the Interior.

Sending the briefing materials via e-mail (briefing book and non-federal participants’ synopsis and Congressional funding request flier as Acrobat files) in advance of meetings is useful and will be continued. This is a meaningful courtesy for the very busy people with whom we meet and shortens the time required to explain our Programs’ objectives and operations – making for better meetings with more informed staff members, and helps our group stay on the established trip itinerary schedule.

Relative to scheduling of the briefing meetings, thanks to all that made this work so well this year. Our estimations of time requirements to complete the briefing meetings were about right (and being lucky helps too). Ideally, we would be able to set more consecutive meetings (in a row) within the Main Interior Building, we will continue to try to get this aspect to work out better but we have to be realistic about expectations.

A big thank you is extended to the Upper Basin and San Juan water users for again hosting the Congressional Staff Appreciation Luncheon and paying for the layout and printing of the non-federal participants’ synopsis and Congressional funding request flier. These are extremely important investments in making these trips work for us. Folks seem to like both the food and the atmosphere at the Tortilla Coast and we will look to doing another event of this kind next year.

More attention should be devoted during the coming year to actually update our briefing document in the ways it makes sense to do so. Of course, this is much easier to write about than it is to actually do, but the Management Committee and the Information and Education Committee should continue to work on further refinements that reformat, simplify and, redirect our briefing document. This effort should get underway no later than early summer so that we are not pressed for time when we need to be getting it off to the printer.

The necessity to conduct these briefing trips has again been irrefutably demonstrated.

I am writing to request your support and assistance in insuring continued funding for the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program and the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program. These ongoing cooperative programs have the dual objectives of recovering four species of endangered fish while water use continues and water development proceeds in compliance with the Endangered Species Act of 1973, state law, and interstate compacts. Partners in the two programs are the States of Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming, Indian tribes, federal agencies and water, power and environmental interests. Wyoming respectfully requests support and action by the Subcommittee that will provide the following:

1. These funds are needed for FWS direct participation in managing and implementing the Upper Colorado Program's actions, monitoring achievement of recovery goals, managing data associated with fish population abundance and sampling, evaluating stocking, and monitoring fish and habitat response to recovery actions.
2. The appropriation of \$437,000 in operation and maintenance funds (Resource Management Appropriation; Fisheries Activity; Hatchery Operations & Maintenance Subactivity, Hatchery Operations Project) to support the ongoing operation of the FWS' Ouray National Fish Hatchery in Utah during fiscal year 2006.
3. The allocation of \$211,000 in "recovery" funds for the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program to the FWS for fiscal year 2006 to meet FWS Region 2 expenses associated with program management and implementing the San Juan Program's actions.

On behalf of the State of Colorado, I am writing to request your support for the Bureau of Reclamation budget line item entitled "Endangered Species Recovery Implementation Program" for the Upper Colorado Region. This item is for \$2,529,000 in the fiscal year 2006 budget and is allocated accordingly: \$1,401,000 for construction projects for the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program; \$572,000 for the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Recovery Program; and \$556,000 for Fish and Wildlife Management and Development.

The Upper Colorado and San Juan programs promote the recovery of four endangered fish in the Upper Colorado River Basin while providing the Endangered Species Act compliance for continued water diversion and development for over 800 water projects on the two rivers, all without a single lawsuit since the two Programs were instituted in 1988 and 1992 respectively. The State of Colorado has partnered with its sister states of Utah, Wyoming and New Mexico, as well as Indian tribes, federal agencies, water and power suppliers and environmental interests to make this program work.

The requested appropriation will allow the Upper Colorado Recovery Program to construct fish passage structures on the Green and Colorado Rivers which will expand habitat for the endangered fish above diversion dams already in place. The San Juan Program will use these requested dollars toward providing in stream flows in cooperation with the State of New Mexico, as well as applying dollars to fish ladders, flooded bottom land restoration, propagation facilities, fish stocking and non-native and sport fish management.

The partnership under which these Programs operate is structured through their authorizing legislation, Public Law 106-392, as amended by P.L. 107-375. While authorizing the Federal Government to provide up to \$46 million in cost share funds for capital construction projects, the Law also requires \$17 million in cost share funds from the states and \$17 million to be

contributed from revenues from the sale of Colorado River Storage Project (CRSP) hydroelectric power.







We are writing to request that the Department of the Interior include funding in the FY 2007 budget, and in subsequent fiscal years, for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to participate in the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish and San Juan River Basin Recovery Programs. The President's fiscal year 2005 budget for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) "zeroed out" \$691,000 in FWS "recovery" funds (Ecological Services Activity; Endangered Species Subactivity; Recovery Element; Colorado Fish Project) for "Colorado River fish recovery." The undersigned submitted a joint letter to the Interior and Related Agencies Appropriations Subcommittee supporting restoration of the Upper Colorado Recovery Program's funds in fiscal year 2005 funds and full funding for the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program. Congress restored the funding to ensure that FWS' Region 6 could meet its funding commitment to the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program. We also transmitted a letter to you dated June 23, 2004 requesting that the committed-to levels of U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service funding would be included in the President's fiscal year 2006 and subsequent years' budgets consistent with the Cooperative Agreements implementing these programs.

We write to you once again because the President's fiscal year 2006 budget again "zeroed out" the \$691,000 in FWS "recovery" funds (Ecological Services Activity; Endangered Species Subactivity; Recovery Element; Colorado Fish Project) for "Colorado River fish recovery." Region 2 of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service did not provide funds for USFWS participation in the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program in fiscal year 2005 nor are the funds in the President's fiscal year 2006 budget. We will seek to restore this essential funding during the fiscal year 2006 appropriations process.

We strongly urge the Department of the Interior to provide funding for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to participate in the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish and San Juan River Basin Recovery Programs in FY 2007 and subsequent fiscal years for salaries, expenses and activities of USFWS program directors and program staff to accomplish recovery activities associated with these two innovative and successful federal-state-private partnerships.

These highly successful, cooperative programs are partnerships among the States of Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming, federal agencies and tribal, water, power and environmental interests. The programs have been ongoing in the Upper Colorado River Basin since 1988 and in the San Juan Basin since 1992. The programs' objectives are recovery of endangered fish species while water development proceeds in compliance with the Endangered Species Act, state law, and interstate compacts. The Department of the Interior routinely heralds these innovative state-federal-private partnerships as "national models" for resolving endangered species and resource development conflicts. Their long track record of progressing towards recovery while providing Endangered Species Act compliance for federal, as well as state, tribal, and private water projects – without controversy or litigation – is exemplary. We look forward to working with you on this and other issues important to our western states in the future.


