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- IV. Abstract:

The Colorado Department of Natural Resources (CDNR), Colorado Parks & Wildlife (CPW) and Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB) provide program management support through administration of aquatic wildlife, water resource management, and technical studies concerning Colorado as identified in the Recovery Implementation Program Recovery Action Plan (RIPRAP). This, as well as broader involvement in the implementation of the Recovery Program action plan occurs through participation and preparation of specific task materials for the Implementation, Management, Biology, and Water Acquisition Committees. Significant activities include the development of interagency agreements, scopes of work, and reports, as well as integration of program research results and other new information for effective planning, guidance, status reviews, and issue resolution within the Program.

Program management tasks performed by CDNR, CPW, and CWCB met expectations. Colorado's participation in key Recovery Program projects and issues was adequately coordinated with Program participants as necessary. These programmatic oversight and administrative activities will continue until recovery and delisting of the fish species is achieved and the federal recovery program and process are disbanded in favor of coordinated conservation programs administered by the affected state wildlife agencies.

Major Accomplishments and Deliverables of FY 2019:

- Leased up to 6,000 acre-feet, with an option for an additional 6,000 acre-feet if needed, of water from Ruedi Reservoir from the Ute Water Conservancy District for instream flow use and to preserve and improve the natural environment of the four endangered fish in the 15-Mile Reach. The Recovery Program released 4,686.92 acre-feet of leased water.
- Participated in flow coordination efforts in the Colorado and Yampa River basins, including participated on weekly phone calls to coordinate on the Green Mountain Reservoir Historic Users Pool and Elkhead flow releases to the Yampa River.
- Continued non-native fish management efforts including holding the annual Elkhead and Ridgway fishing tournaments and participating in the Rio Blanco Water Conservancy District Fishing Derby.
- Supported the reauthorization and funding of the program including providing assistance in securing funding for 2020.
- Participated in post-2023 Program planning.
- Continued participation in the development of a White River Programmatic Biological Opinion including participating on the White River Planning Team, reviewing flow recommendations, funding the modeling efforts, and completing a competitive bid process for the development of White River Management Plan.
- Participated in the annual Washington D.C. briefing trip that was conducted from March 12-14, 2019.
- Colorado Parks and Wildlife chaired the Biology Committee in 2019.
- Completed Program and task annual reports.

IX. Recommendations: Program participants must continue to support the recovery and the delisting of the four endangered fish. We recommend continued support of Program Management, including support for reauthorization and funding of the Program through FY 2023. Continued focus on post-2023 planning should be a priority of the Program and its participants.
